

At the DEC and in recent weeks there have been questions about how the Department can give guidance on the Post ALR chapter. Nevada is one of the Departments where the ALR program is not chartered by the Department and every chapter is completely managed by the individual Post. That is not to say that there are no rules to be followed; there are a handful of rules as determined by National and summarized in Resolution 5 (https://www.legion.org/getmedia/28a26a18-369e-47da-a82b-77100edcb32a/ALR-Resolution-5-2021.pdf) that must be followed to be an ALR Chapter. While it would be nice to have uniformity between Chapters, the lack of a Department Charter is useful in allowing each Chapter to be operated in a way that works for their respective location. What works in the Las Vegas area may not work in Elko. I am always available if you need general guidance on developing your charter.

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Greetings Legionnaires,

More than 9,000 mail-in ballots across Nevada were not counted because voters did not verify their signatures before the curing deadline.

On Election Day, Democratic Nevada Secretary of State Cisco Aguilar said signature issues swayed toward younger voters who rarely signed their names. Nevada law allows a voter to cure their ballot until six days after Election Day.

County clerks are required to alert voters to a ballot signature issue. In 2022, 5,979 ballots statewide needing a signature cure were not counted -2% of the total of mail-in ballots.

Close margins often decide Nevada elections: This election, Democratic Sen. Jacky Rosen won reelected by about 23,000 votes. In 2022, Nevada Republican Gov. Joe Lombardo won by about 15,000 votes; Democratic Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto won by about 8,000 votes.

Nevada broke its record for signature cures completed of mail ballots, as well as for votes that were not counted because of ineligible signatures in this month's election.

The signatures on more than 23,000 mail ballots were successfully cured in last month's election — meaning election officials confirmed an eligible voter was linked to a ballot with a signature not matching the one in the state's voter file, and the issue was resolved.

The total number of amended signatures exceeded the combined cures completed in 2020 and 2022, the only other general elections with widespread mail voting. In all, about 1.5 million votes were cast in the general election. The votes that were not counted mostly came from registered nonpartisans, while about 40 percent of the successfully cured ballots were from Democrats and about a quarter coming from Republicans.

The bigger issue was voter turnout. There are 2,042,607 active registered voters in Nevada, 1,487,887 (72.84%) voted. Nationally, 88,000,000 eligible voters did not cast a ballot, that's 11,500,000 more people than who voted for Trump. None-of-the-above won the election. People don't feel that either party represents them or reflect their values. A major culprit is closed partisan primaries, which produce candidates that only appeal to a third of voters.

The bright side, as far as Legion politics are concerned, having one party control all three houses should make it easier to pass veteran specific legislation. This doesn't mean its time to slacken our resolve. We need to engage our representatives, & congressional leadership, in order to keep our goals in the forefront.



On November 18th, H.R. 8371 – The Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act passed the House and was received by the Senate the next day. 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Nevada Boys State

American Legion Boys State is among the most respected and selective educational programs of government instruction for U.S. high school students. A participatory program in which students become part of the operation of local, county, and state government, Boys State was founded in 1935 to counter the socialism-inspired Young Pioneer Camps. The program was the idea of two Illinois Legionnaires, Hayes Kennedy and Harold Card, who organized the first Boys State at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield. At Boys State, participants learn the rights, privileges, and responsibilities of franchised citizens. The training is objective and centers on the structure of city, county, and state governments. Operated by students elected to various offices, Boys State activities include legislative sessions, court proceedings, law-enforcement presentations, assemblies, bands, choruses, and recreational programs. American Legion posts select High School Juniors to attend the program. In most cases, individual expenses are paid by a sponsoring post, a local business, or another community-based organization. Boys State programs currently exist in all Legion departments in the United States except Hawaii. As separate corporations, Boys State programs vary in content and method of procedure, but each adheres to the same basic concept: teaching government from the township to the state level.

Nevada Boys State Eligibility

The American Legion has certain qualifications for prospective Boys State citizens. Following are the recommended guidelines employed by most Boys State programs. Students in high school are considered. Previous participants of a Boys State competition are not allowed to attend a second session. Only those who illustrate leadership, character, scholarship, loyalty and service in their schools and community should be considered. Merit and ability are the basis for evaluation during the actual citizens selection process. Boys State competitions are in compliance with Federal handicap laws. The program requires a medical/parental consent certificate signed by a parent and registered doctor. The selection process often differs in Legion departments. The ideal method is for schools to recommend lists of eligible candidates to local Legion posts. The post would then conduct interviews and select their representative(s) for the program.

Boys Nation

Two representatives from each of the 49 Boys State programs represent their state at Boys Nation in Washington, where the young leaders receive an education on the structure and function of federal government. The first Boys Nation – then called Boys Forum of National Government – convened at American University in Washington in August 1946.

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The 1946 American Legion National Convention adopted the event as an official youth activity. Three years later, it became American Legion Boys Nation. At the event, each delegate acts as a senator from his Boys State. The young lawmakers caucus at the beginning of the session, then organize into committees and conduct hearings on bills submitted by program delegates. Senators learn the proper method of handling bills, according to U.S. Senate rules. Participation in the political process is emphasized throughout the week, including organization of party conventions and nominating and electing a president and vice president. The week of government training also includes lectures, forums and visits to federal agencies, national shrines, institutions, memorials, and historical sites. On Capitol Hill, Boys Nation senators meet with elected officials from their home states. Since Boys Nation began in 1946, a number of its graduates have been elected to public office, including presidents, congressmen, state governors and state legislators. Many others have been inspired to work for the campaigns of individuals seeking public office.

On Saturday, November 9, 2024, American Legion Auxiliary Unit 51 of North Las Vegas, held its fall Poppy Drive. The Unit does a Poppy Drive twice a year – once in May, close to Memorial Day, and another in November, close to Veterans Day.

The November 9th Poppy Drive was held at the Smith's Grocery Store in Aliante, a division of North Las Vegas. It began around 7:00 am and ended around noon.

This was a really good drive for Unit 51. Total collected was \$885.00. As Poppy funds must be used to directly benefit veterans or active-duty personnel, the decision was made to send half to Fisher House, and the other half to Trees for Troops.

Fisher House is a facility on the grounds of the VA Hospital in North Las Vegas that provides housing to patients of the VA Hospital and their families while a veteran is undergoing medical treatment. Fisher House provides a "wish list" of things that their residents can use, such as paper products (think Kleenex), laundry detergent, toiletries, and snack items.

Trees for Troops provides a Christmas Trees to U.S. Military Families at Camp Pendleton. One of the advantages of Trees for Troops is that it is sponsored in part by FedEx, and FedEx is making a donation to American Legion Baseball for every tree purchased. Trees for Troops report that since 2005, they have provided over 309,000 Christmas trees for active-duty personnel.
